My dear Friends

We've got a rather unusual event coming up on the weekend of 14/15 May which I'd like to tell you about.

Several weeks ago I, along with all other serving clergy in the C of E, received a circular letter from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York.

It was headed: A Call to Prayer in the week leading up to Pentecost 2016 [15 May].

Their Graces went on to write:

"Like us, you will know that ministry is empty and barren without prayer. That is why we are taking the unprecedented step of writing to every serving parish priest in the Church of England inviting you and your people to join us in a week of prayer for the evangelisation of our nation. In the week leading up to Pentecost (8–15 May) we long to see a great wave of prayer across our land, throughout the Church of England and many other Churches. Our hope is

- for all Christians to deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ;
- for all of us to have confidence to share the Gospel
- for all to respond to the call of Jesus Christ to follow Him as disciples, to live out the Gospel and to seek God's kingdom from day to day.

"At the heart of our prayers will be the words that Jesus Christ himself taught us - 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done.' It is impossible to overstate the life-transforming power of the Lord's Prayer... When we pray it with sincerity and with joy, there is no imagining the new ways in which God can use us to his glory.

"But how? We are aware that many dioceses, cathedrals, parishes, and chaplaincies will already be preparing to engage in special times of prayer and witness at that time. If this applies to you, please do not see this letter as an additional burden; we simply ask that your own prayers, as you engage in your diocesan or parish plans, should include your longing that more should come to know Christ."

Way back in January, as reported in the February LINK, our PCC decided to hold a Weekend of Thanksgiving and Giving, coincidentally on that Pentecost weekend that the Archbishops were now writing about. The PCC's thoughts had been about how to encourage people to review their regular giving earlier in the year instead of relying on large one-off donations at our November Gift Day; Gift Day could then be scaled back or even not held at all. Thankfulness to God is the greatest motivation for Christian giving – hence the idea of 'Thanksgiving and Giving'.

The Archbishops' initiative actually fits in with this very well. After all, there is no greater gift of God for which to give thanks than Jesus Christ and his gospel, and the precious freedom which we still have to live it out and pass it on. Equally the mission of St Michaels, to 'Know Christ and Make Him Known', while not about money, cannot be done without it, whether we're thinking of our in-house or local activities, or the support of Christian outreach thousands of miles away.

There will certainly be mention of money and giving that weekend, and helpful materials, but the centrepiece is a planned 24 hours of continuous prayer in the church from 7am Saturday to 7am Sunday, the aim being to have at least two people present at all times, with the emphasis on the evangelisation of our nation. A small group has been formed to plan the details, and you may expect some appeals and sign-up sheets to appear shortly.

If you've ever taken part in a prayer vigil before, I'm sure you'll agree with me that the time passes remarkably quickly, and that it is an enjoyable and deeply satisfying experience; but don't worry, we shall also be mindful of the practicalities and how important it is that those praying should be, and feel, safe and secure at all times, especially in the night hours.

MISSION OF THE MONTH CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 15-21 MAY 2016

Jesus calls us to love our neighbours and not just those that live next door or down the street. Christian Aid Week unites over 20,000 churches to put their love into action, and that includes **ST MICHAELS, BRAINTREE!!**

Christian Aid exists to help those in need – regardless of religion, ethnicity or nationality. It works through partners overseas: churches, ecumenical bodies and movements who have common values and competence in eradicating poverty. Christian Aid takes seriously its commitment to measuring impact, making a difference and having leverage for great results. It is a leading force against global poverty as well as being a well-managed, flexible and professional organisation.

Right now in Ethiopia more than 10 million people are suffering from hunger and thirst as the country faces the worst drought in three decades. Farmers haven't been able to harvest any crops for two consecutive seasons! Families are going hungry as they struggle to find enough food, and more than 400,000 children are experiencing severe malnutrition. Without urgent funding to address the food shortages, the humanitarian situation will deteriorate even further. Earlier this year, Christian Aid released £50,000 of emergency funds to help some of the most vulnerable people in the hardest-hit communities. The money provided school meals for 4,000 children whose families don't have enough food to give them even one meal a day. They have also made sure that 700 children in two more schools have access to safe drinking water. Further assessments are being made to enable plans for further emergency responses.

In Bangladesh, Morsheda (pictured) lives in fear of the river. No matter how hard she works, every year the floods damage her home, leaving her and her four children struggling to cope.

Just £250 is enough for a Christian Aid Home Safety package which would flood-proof her home by raising it 8ft and also provide her with a goat, seeds and a wormery (to make compost!) – thus giving her a lifetime income and a safer life.





For various reasons, door to door collections are becoming less easy but we at St Michaels can aim to help by making use of the Christian Aid envelopes which will be given out on 15 May in church and which will also be available on the display table for the whole month. Please pray about what your response can be to this year's countrywide effort to help those who have such a struggle to cope, whereas we almost take it for granted to accept all that we can enjoy. The envelopes can be returned to the offertory boxes in church. **THANK YOU!!**

GARDENING TIPS

The chilli plants are now being replanted into new pots. They will be going into the greenhouse that I have now put out. From some research I have found out that if the roots are stressed then the chilli produces hotter fruit at it feels it needs to produce more seeds.

I would also this month look after the strawberries with the support of straw to prevent the fruit forming and rotting. These will need a gentle feed and consistent watering to ensure that they grow evenly.



Still with vegetables, I would still keep an eye on the tomatoes and place them outside to harden off, keeping a watch for a late frost. Tomatoes when grown in a grow-bag can benefit from the extra layer a grow bag pot brings to it. It gives extra depth to the roots whilst making it

easy to water.

Prune your penstemons now cut all the old shoots back to the base provided there is new growth at the bottom of the plant. If there are no new shoots at the base, cut just above the lowest set of leaves. Cuttings can also be put into root hormone then put into a pot of potting compost. If you keep this gently watered you will see the growth of new plants.

As Jack and Joyce Green were away on holiday, to Harsha and me fell the great honour of attending the Fishermen's Mission AGM in London on 12 April and collecting on behalf of St Michaels Church their **2015 Christian Fellowship Award**, in recognition of literally decades of regular support. Nearly all of you will know of the Mission through Andy Malcolm, who for years has come to us at the start of December, with an update on the Mission and a lively Christmas message.

The meeting took place in the sumptuous setting of Trinity House, overlooking the Tower of London and Tower Bridge. There were various formalities to be dealt with, one of which was to read out a thankyou letter from their patron The Queen, to whom they had sent Loyal Greetings on the occasion of her 90th birthday. Jill Henderson announced her retirement as Chairman; she is to be succeeded by Prof Glyn Tonge.

We then moved on to the Awards part of the proceedings – and what a variety there was! Chantelle almost broke down as she spoke of the constant anxiety of fishermen's wives, never sure whether their husbands would come home safely.



Rev Derath Durkin (Twitter Friend of the Year 2015) told us of how she had become involved as a volunteer with the Mission on her retirement to Newlyn, Cornwall, and had taken on a huge amount of schools work.

Our visit concluded with a very stylish buffet lunch, during which we were able to chat to various members of the Council, and of course catch up with Andy Malcolm (pictured above with Harsha and me), who as always was on great form. He sends warmest greetings to St Michaels.
