#### THE GLASS IS HALF EMPTY!

#### **FARMING SEASON**

The end of 2021 and the beginning of 2022 look set to remain wet, mild and grey. The soil has become very saturated and it has become difficult to even walk on the field let alone get a tractor on. On the whole, I am pleased with how the wheat crops are growing however you can see how the wet soil affects the plants, particularly the later drilled crops which are less established. When the soil becomes saturated, the moisture fills the pockets of air with water depriving the plant of oxygen which in turn can stunt its growth and begin to turn the leaves yellow. This is a good time to check the land drains are working properly and look for problem drainage areas, which may be able to be rectified in the future.



Over the Christmas break we have taken family walks and the picture attached was taken on one. It is often a good time to reflect on the past year and look ahead to the future and arable farming is no different. 2022 looks like it will be a challenging year with input costs such as artificial fertilizer going up at an alarming rate mainly because of the increase in gas prices. Then there is also the on going challenge of reducing our emission of greenhouse gases so in this article I will be looking at future technologies which will hopefully help reduce our inputs and also reduce the carbon footprint of our industry, however as often is the case with new technology it is not without its controversies.

The latest farming machinery increasingly relies on satellite navigation and computer processing and this is all for the benefit of what is now termed 'precision farming'. Precision farming involves analysing the soil of every square metre of a field to better understand the strengths and weaknesses of the nutrients contained within that soil. This information is then downloaded into the tractor and its implement, such as the crop sprayer or fertilizer spreader, which is especially adapted to alter its distribution pattern automatically as the tractor passes over the varying soil pattern. With satellite navigation the tractor can position itself to within two centimetres of accuracy when travelling on the field and it uses this locational guidance to vary the rate of the inputs it applies to the crop according to the information which has been given. The farmer ultimately makes the decision on where to increase or decrease the agrichemical inputs based on the soil analysis, the plant strength and the conditions. Sounds complicated and expensive? Well yes it is, which is why many farmers have yet to invest in this type of technology even though there is potential to save input costs and even enhance crop yields. One of the big problems is that even though the farmer may have all this data on his soil types and plant strength he cannot accurately predict

what type of season the weather will provide in terms of sunlight and rainfall and these are two of the most important factors.

The next idea is a bigger deal, and even considered by some to be a game changer, and this is genetically modified crops. This involves genetically engineering the plants DNA to either improve its potential, make it more resilient to drought, disease and pests or even give it a competitive advantage against weeds. This could potentially make crops cheaper to grow and generally make farming more productive. Wheat, for example, has been grown and developed for well over 10,000 years. In the beginning, our ancestors would have naturally selected plants which held onto their seeds longer so they could be harvested more easily as plants have a natural tendency to disperse their seeds. Since then, over thousands of years, the wheat plants have been selected to improve yields and other traits which make them easier to grow. GM crops could dramatically speed up this process of plant development and even improve it in ways which could not be naturally created. For example, a wheat plant could be modified to have a root structure like a leguminous plant such as a pea or bean plant. This would enable it to fix some of its own nitrogen in the roots enabling the farmer to reduce the amount of fertilizer he applies to the crop, making the crop cheaper to grow, and reducing the carbon footprint!

Clearly, GM foods are controversial mainly because there is a possibility that unintended gene transfer could take place beyond the crop. The consequences of such a transfer would be completely uncertain, although in practice genetically engineered plants only have a short lifespan. The political will to progress with such technology is becoming stronger particularly in light of the pandemic. Our political leaders are often keen to say that they will be 'guided by the science' even though they

usually don't know the outcomes any better than the rest of us, however despite the scepticism, scientific advances have often improved our lives and sometimes even saved them. I am reminded of Genesis 1:26 where God says... "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness: and let them have dominion over all the earth." With this degree of control comes much responsibility so it's a relief that ultimately the control and responsibility belongs to God Himself. Bearing this in mind it's important we make the right decisions going forward not just for ourselves but also to please God too, after all it is His creation!

#### A LESSON IN PATIENCE

So often we think we can just do as we please with our lives and then come running to God for a few minutes of prayer and get an answer right away but I don't believe it is always that simple. Even Moses needed to be prepared for six full days in order to be able experience the awesome presence of the Lord! If **Moses** had to wait six days – then it should not surprise us if we need to wait 60 days, 60 months or even 60 years for the Lord to prepare us to receive His blessing!

Be encouraged! The Lord is preparing us for great things. Spend more time seeking Him and worshipping Him. Keep waiting at His feet. He will meet us! There's so much work to be done.
