Dear Friends,

The past two and a half years have been unprecedented times, in many ways. Some of our basic assumptions have been challenged as we have lived through the coronavirus pandemic.

In line with many churches during the pandemic, we have been through various phases. There were times when the church building was closed, YouTube video services were recorded from our homes, "St Michael's by Phone" was created, then we returned to the church building, initially socially distanced and with face coverings. At various stages, these changes were required by law or were just government or Church of England guidance.

We are now very much back in the church building. Whilst many people in our church family have returned to "in-person" church services, some people have either not returned at all, or not returned as regularly.

On Sunday 11th September, we are having a "Back to Church Sunday". We will have services at 8am, 10am & 6.30pm that day, as well as Junior Church for children & young people at 10am. We would encourage everyone who is able, to join us, in person in St Michael's Church that day.

We will be asking the question, "Why is church so special?" By church, I mean the people of God who meet in the church building. Part of the answer is that, as we meet together as a church family, we can encourage one another and obey Jesus' command to love one another (John 15:12).

If you prefer to be socially distanced in church, do please sit around the sides of the church at the 10am service, or join us for the 8am or 6.30pm services, which tend to be smaller in number.

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." (Hebrews 10:24-25)

MISSION OF THE MONTH



Tearfund is a Christian charity that partners with churches in more than 50 of the world's poorest countries. They believe that poverty exists as a result of

God is calling all of us to play our part and bring an end to extreme poverty and injustice.

Soaring temperatures in the UK in recent months have acted as a stark reminder: we are in a climate emergency. Around the world, extreme weather events are becoming more frequent and intense. From prolonged heatwaves across Europe to landslides in Brazil, drought in Afghanistan and failed rainy seasons in East Africa – to name just a few – the impacts of the climate crisis are widespread.

Such events not only lead to lives being lost and people being displaced, but they are often followed by food shortages and a loss of jobs and income, pushing communities back, or deeper, into poverty.

But we have hope in a powerful God who is able to break into this crisis and bring restoration.

It is in times like these when we evaluate what is really important and fondly recollect many memories. Towards the end of her life my mother suffered with Parkinson's disease, which is a degenerative disorder of the central nervous system but this is not how she will be remembered by me. In the farming world we often talk about the weather and the machinery we use, but as in any industry it boils down to the input of the people which can have the biggest impact on how the business is run.

Throughout the majority of her working life my mother fulfilled the role of a farmer's wife which in her generation involved supporting my father in running the business and managing the household. To me she was the cornerstone of the family and the

role was a non stop one always preparing and supporting, which included our grandparents and the farm staff. Until her dying day mum never lost her sense of humour and there was always much laughter and singing in the house.

Underpinning everything my mum did was her faith and she attended St Andrew's Church in Shalford throughout over 55 years of married life where she served as a church warden for over 40 years reliably attending services week after week. I remember reading Ladybird Bible stories with her as a child which both helped me to begin learning the Bible and how to read.

The best memories of my mum will be the trips across the fields walking the dog and looking at the crops. She loved both the countryside and her dogs and it was fitting that the last thing she did was go with my family and our dog for a ride up the fields on a beautiful summers evening.

WHO CAN BE AGAINST US?

"What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?" (Romans 8:31-32)
