

Dear David and Kirsty,

I send you greetings from Uganda. How are you doing at this trying time? We pray that Almighty God protects you and your family from this global crisis of corona virus.

Please our love and prayers to Christians of St. Michael's and Rev. Nigel.

We have heard over the TVs and radios that it is worse in UK, that you have lost more than 30,000 people. Please know that you have all our prayers.

In Uganda we are still in the lock down with around 100 corona cases. There is a big threat from the cargo drivers from Kenya, Congo, Tanzania and Rwanda who drive through Uganda, most of the new infections are within this category and these drivers have wives along the way.





The situation at Chain is not all that bad, as I informed you we have around 10 staff members who are there full time taking care of children led by Auntie Bridget. Other staff members are at home and we use phones for contact. Mostly children play and do digging in the mornings.

My family is also Ok, greetings from Florence.

A ROCHA INTERNATIONAL ENEWS JUNE 2020

Coral bleaching and a warming world



Coral bleaching is the biggest threat facing reefs today, including those in Watamu Marine National Park, opposite A Rocha Kenya's field study centre.

Bleaching events are not new here, with the last severe occurrence in 1998. But high survival rates following bleaching in 2013 and 2016 give us hope that Watamu's corals may be adapting to cope

better with heat stress. Now in 2020 the reefs are bleaching again, so A Rocha Kenya's marine team, working in partnership with Kenya Wildlife Service, are back in the water, using permanent quadrats to photograph the same patches of reef every month and observing the response of each coral from bleaching to either mortality or survival.

Pray

Corals create the habitat for a host of other marine life. So a severe bleaching event can have serious implications for wildlife and local people who depend on the reef. It is not yet known how many of the corals in Watamu Marine National Park will die as a result of the current bleaching. Please pray for A Rocha Kenya's marine team and Kenya Wildlife Service as they



continue to collect data that will allow them to assess the extent of the damage over the next few months. And pray too that the coral would make a dramatic recovery.

Lifesaver: Tippy tap, Uganda

Research suggests that handwashing with soap is one of the most effective and inexpensive ways of preventing the spread of COVID-19, as well as reducing the risk of other diseases such as diarrhoea and pneumonia. But not everyone has reliable access to running water. For only £5, you

can purchase a tippy tap for a school or family in Uganda, you can improve the hygiene and health of children and help keep families safe. This simple handwashing device will also save precious water – vital for communities facing unpredictable rainfall due to climate change.

FOUR MARKS OF A DISCIPLE

(From Swiss Calendar Published By Näher Zu Dir)

Based on four features we would like to consider what discipleship concretely means for us Christians.

I) A disciple follows His Master:

We follow the Lord Jesus on the path He walked. His path leads through difficulties and ends in Heaven. Our goal is the same: As His disciples we are 'en route' to Heaven. Until we get there we experience a lot which will test our Faith.

2) A disciple obeys His Master:

The twelve showed us this. Willingly they did what the Lord ordered. We too as disciples of the Lord Jesus are asked to obey His Word and to do what He orders us to do. (John 14: 21)

3) A disciple imitates His Master:

The Lord Jesus left us an example so we can walk in His footsteps (I Peter 2: 21-23). He would like that people in our behaviour will see something of Him. How much He is pleased when we copy His goodness and gentleness, His faithfulness and justice.

4) A disciple acknowledges His Master:

The Lord Jesus was discarded by the people. Even today He is rejected by the World. But He is worth it that we align with Him and confess Him before the people. The disgrace which as a result falls on us we want to bear. He will reward it. (Matthew 20: 32)

We don't know when we'll be allowed to open churches again; it could be weeks or months before we're able to meet our new church family and settle in properly. We don't know what school Elijah and Sarah will go to. We're moving house twice because the house in Hampton has tenants who are unable to move but the college needs our house to be empty for new students.

There are a few things we're uncertain about, but we are very sure of a God who goes before us, stands behind us and surrounds us with all the comfort and peace we always claimed we needed but didn't always know just how much until the earth shakes a little under our feet. LIFE AT CORNHILL

This from Anne Wigmore whom many of you will remember ...daughter of John and Maggie Wigmore.

As a third-year student, I find that Cornhill takes up about three days of my week. Two days at Cornhill and a day of work doing preparation. The preparation is varied - there is work to do for Thursday seminars working through a book of the Bible and preparation for electives on leading Bible studies and youth and children's work. There is also preparation to do for Friday mornings looking at a book of the Bible in lectures and also for teaching practice on Friday afternoons where we will either be giving a 20-minute talk or feeding back on the talks of others. The prep time is great and like most things, the more you do the more you benefit.

On the other days of my week I play an active role as part of my church family. I help to run the II-18s programme under the guidance of our youth and children's minister Jamie. On a Sunday for the I4-18s we would either do a cooked breakfast before the service, or a chat post service about the sermon, both of which we have found really encouraging and helpful for building important friendships — and a good way to check they paid attention! For the younger half, we take them out of the main part of the service to do a short Bible study but always looking at the same passage as the rest of the church family.

Midweek, we are beginning to do some one-to-ones. This is where I've really felt the benefit of Cornhill, being confident to just open the Bible with a younger sister in Christ and get thinking about God's Word together. Cornhill is such a great way to spend time just getting to know the Bible and then sharing what you are learning with others. On Thursday evenings, we will meet all together for games and food, but with the central part being a I0-minute talk on a Bible passage. Again, the training at Cornhill has really transformed my approach to giving talks! I am much clearer and feel far more confident in handling the Bible well. Feeling more equipped on account of my training at

Cornhill, I am also leading one of the midweek Bible study groups for the church family. The resources we're given at Cornhill have really breathed some fresh air into areas like evangelism, church outreach and even structuring a typical youth group evening.

Studying at Cornhill hasn't only helped in areas of ministry but in my own faith too. The things I have learnt at college have changed my heart and not just built up head knowledge. I am so grateful that this is what the lecturers encourage.

The rest of my week is spent working as a child minder, and when I need to unwind I'm either catching up with friends, reading a good book or trying new recipes!
