Signs of new life

Despite all we have been going through, may I wish you a very happy Easter, as we celebrate (arguably) the greatest of the Christian festivals. I say that because over a quarter of the four gospels (23 out of 89 chapters) focus on the last week of Jesus' earthly life.

A great deal happened in that week, beginning with Palm Sunday and ending on Easter Sunday. In Holy Week, Jesus went willingly to the cross, to die an agonising death, not for his wrongdoing, but for ours. "For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God. He was put to death in the body but made alive by the Spirit." (I Peter 3:18). Jesus died so that we can, in repentance and faith, receive God's forgiveness ... to bring us to God.

But wonderfully, he rose to life on the third day, to bring victory over both sin and death. As Jesus himself said, "I am the resurrection and the life." (John I I:25).

Easter coincides with Spring - a time when we see new life \dots flowers, blossom and lighter evenings.

This Easter will also bring something new to our church life as well. From Easter Sunday we will be re-opening the church for a 10am service each Sunday. Do please join us, if you would like to. You will need to book a seat by the Thursday before (via our website or by phoning the church office). We need to have some limitations (as in the autumn) including social distancing, face coverings and no congregational singing. But we hope it will be an uplifting and helpful experience, to be back in church worshipping our risen Lord.

May this Easter be a happy one for you, not because life is necessarily happy or easy, but because you know God's forgiveness and new life.

MISSION OF THE MONTH MAKE JESUS KNOWN

At the start of the first lockdown Tim decided to switch all MJK's efforts to spread the Gospel of Christ into social media .

He had been using them for a monthly Spirit Boost video that many of you have used but from March 2020 everything was online. In April and again in May over fifty people came to Christ.

It soon became clear that not all could be linked to local churches and so Tim set up a support network (New Christians) online. Early on Tim linked all sorts of questions about life and covid to MJK's website

In the last year hundreds of others have been added to the Kingdom of God through MJK's work on Facebook, YouTube, Snapchat, Twitter and What's App. Changes in the algorithms used by these platforms reduced the impact across these platforms and so MJK has had to hire an algorithm specialist to restore its breadth of contact with new folk.

Please pray this will be successful.

Pray too for the team dealing with responses many of which are quite distressing as folk with serious personal and contextual situations get in touch. MJK is now working online with people from all round the world, including areas like Pakistan where persecution of Christians is the norm.

Pray for wisdom for the team as they communicate online.

During 2019 the possibility of leasing an empty commercial site on the edge of Oldham centre arose. It would make a useful base for film making indoors (now essential for the online footprint of MJK) and a recording studio for the music which, with accompanying videos, the band was still putting out on the web.

The site also offered the possibility of setting up a milk bar which could act as a first point of contact for students to drop in to on their way to the bus and tram station. After a lot of prayer and explanations by Tim Christian trusts agreed to support the project and the local council were attracted by the plan to use the site to teach local youth how to make videos and recordings (and introduce them to the gospel). All this was on hold during lockdown one but since then the team have worked on site to clear away the old use material and with masses of help from local tradesmen (often at cost and sometimes for free) who can see the benefit the work would give the renovation has progressed so that this summer it will open as another way of bringing the good news of the Lord Jesus to Oldham.

Please pray for the success of this work and for continuing funding. Pray too for a good relationship with the community and council which is Moslem dominated.

THE NEW NORMAL - NEARLY THERE?

Evening news on BBC TV shows the latest statistics about the Covid virus in the UK and they are sad. The number of deaths is reported and behind these numbers lie unhappy stories of real people and their families. The only consolation is that the number of cases, hospitalisations and deaths are going down.

THE END IN SIGHT

Coupled with schools re-opening, Nightingale Hospitals closing and the hope of shops opening gives us hope that soon things will be back to normal - or the 'new normal' as we now call it.

Interestingly the 'new normal' is dawning around the time Christians celebrate Easter. The new normal is tentative – we hope that if things go well, if we observe the rules, if the R number gets below I then we could have free summer.

'We could have' - it's all uncertain (See the news from Italy). Let's hope that by the middle of June the 'could' is turned to 'we've made it!' However, the Christian message of the resurrection of Jesus speaks not of a 'new normal' but of a 'better normal' and one that is certain. There is no 'could' or 'maybe' about it.

BETTER NORMAL

There will be for certain a 'better normal'. That is because Jesus Christ rose from the dead. It is tempting to go over the evidence for this certainty – the empty tomb, Mary meeting with Jesus, then Jesus meeting with his ten friends, a week later inviting Thomas to touch his side and his hands. He ate meals with his friends. No wonder these accounts are special to Christians and they keep them and read them at least once a year. They would be happy to take them to court and let them be scrutinised. They have no fear that the resurrection of Jesus Christ is 'alleged' or a 'myth' or 'legend'. They have stood up to the closest examination.

WON'T LAST FOR EVER WILL LAST FOR EVER.

Whatever the new normal will look like, it won't last for ever. Cemeteries and crematorium remind us of that. But the Christian message tells us that there is a resurrection. Our Lord Jesus Christ said that he will raise up all who come to him. His words are recorded in John 6:44.

In fact, they will be restored to normal life. The life we lead now, whether in lock-down or whether covid free is not normal. The pain, suffering, disease and growing and the evil we find within ourselves were not intended to be normal. That's not God's 'normal'.

God's loving kindness has something far greater in store for us – the normal life. Sharing Christ's resurrection life won't be boring. Those who are his won't be able to get over enjoying his love and glory. It will never grow stale but get better every day in the bodily resurrection life of heaven.

If that is the case then it is sensible to get an interest in the real normal life. Why not apply to Jesus Christ for the better normal?
