In the six weeks of the school holidays, we will be having 10am family services focusing on some "Friends of Jesus".

- On Sun 24th July, we will look at a generous boy, whose gift to Jesus led to **the Feeding of the 5,000**, and will be thinking about how we can give what we have.
- On Sun 31st July, we learn from **Martha & Mary's** time with Jesus, and how listening to Jesus is more important than being busy.
- On Sun 7th Aug, we reflect on **Jesus' calling of Levi** that Jesus didn't come to call righteous people, but sinners.

On Saturday 13th September 2013 at least 4 gunmen attacked shoppers in Nairobi's Westgate shopping centre. It was reported that 71 people were killed.

Yet God is still good. Here is a genuine example of his goodness.

DR GLADYS MWITI

Having studied for her doctorate, Gladys returned to Nairobi launching 'OASIS AFRICA COUNSELLING CENTRE'. This was set up in her community because of the suffering she observed. She, as a Christian, set out to help victims of the 13th September tragedy.

RWANDA

Her work was soon extended. She has been helping folk deeply scarred by the Rwanda genocide. Today, it is said of her that she is a global authority on trauma counselling.

HER OWN WORDS

This is what Gladys says about why she does this work. 'For me, my theme in life is to know Christ and make him known'

LANGHAM PARTNERSHIP

Here then is a convinced Christian lady, selected by her church because of her ability and sent to study and train under LANGHAM PARTNERSHIP (LP). Now she is using her skills and knowledge of Jesus to heal in a traumatised world.

Gladys and the work of LANGHAM PARTNERSHIP show that God is still good to his troubled world. His goodness often takes time. Gladys had to leave her home to study so that she could help. FARMING SEASON

I hope everybody has been enjoying the summer weather. Unfortunately for us farmers it has been too dry and although the sunshine is welcome the dry conditions mean the ears of grain will not reach their full potential and the plant will begin to die off early. No significant rainfall is forecast in the coming week, however with Wimbledon starting hopefully some heavy downpours might appear! In parts of France the barley harvest will have already started and many countries in Europe are normally ahead of us. My Dad used to remind me how big our planet is by saying that somewhere in the world everyday there is a harvest! The wheat harvest is looking like it will be marginally early depending on how hot and dry the weather gets in July, so we could be harvesting by the end of the month.

The war in Ukraine and Covid pandemic continue to have implications for our industry. Food commodity price continue to remain near record levels however they have now fallen off their highs with the expectation of a reasonable harvest in Europe. Global supply chains are still struggling from the pandemic and waiting times for spare parts and new machines have become a problem for some farmers. This is nothing compared to the problems some Ukrainian farmers face, who have had their farms raided by Russian troops with their equipment and grain taken and their land nationalized by the Russian state.

I hope these man made disasters, including climate change, will remind all of us what a precious and delicate world we live in and when we (mankind) are irresponsible and selfish ultimately the biggest losers will be us and future generations. Despite our constant mistakes nature has a wonderful ability to keep regenerating and giving which is something we can always thank God for.



On a brighter note the puppies our dog Cherry had are all doing well and are now almost completely weaned. They have indeed bought fun and excitement to certain members of our household and many visitors, but I think Rachel and myself will be pleased to see them go to their new homes in a few weeks time. Ten puppies have been a lot to handle and although some breeders may have been pleased I would have preferred about five! This is not something we will put Cherry through again either. They often say that a litter is

good for the dog however I'm not convinced she would agree with that. The good news is Cherry has now fully recovered from the ordeal but I think she would like a bit more attention and less to the puppies.

We are not at the stage yet where combines can drive themselves which is a good thing because the combine driver can really get a good insight into which parts of the field are performing as the yield meter estimates the real time crop yield as the machine moves along. I find this particularly fascinating so it's a good job the combine

can steer itself! At the moment we have the combine in the yard checking everything from the belts to the bearings so nothing should go wrong when the time comes to get going. After we do start harvest we will hoping for a nice warm, dry and sunny period so this will be a time when we can all be enjoying good weather together!


Are you feeling unstable today? Look up! The Lord will steady you. Heaven is your goal and God will provide the power and direction to bring you safely there!


