MISSION OF THE MONTH SAMARITAN'S PURSE

Samaritan's Purse is an evangelical Christian relief organisation that provides aid to suffering people throughout the world who are victims of war, famine, natural disaster, poverty and disease.

One aspect of their work is *Operation Christmas Child*, (OCC). They collect and distribute filled shoeboxes to children living in poverty particularly in Africa, Eastern Europe and Central Asia. Boxes are distributed to children where needed, regardless of background or faith. The shoeboxes give children a present, for some, probably the first they receive. This is a practical way of showing God's love to children.

Children receiving boxes are given the opportunity to take part in a 12 session course called The Greatest Journey, with their parent or guardian's consent. This enables them to find out who Jesus is, begin their own journey of faith and share it with others.

St Michael's Church has been involved with this project for many years, with the exception of 2020 due to the Covid 19 pandemic. This year (as we did last year), we are able to collect shoebox gifts in person and online. The shoeboxes donated in person will be delivered to our nearest processing centre during national collection week. Please bring completed shoeboxes to the church welcome area by **Sunday 13**th **November 2022**.

National collection week for 2022 will be between 14th-21st November.

If you are not able to donate a shoebox in person, packing a shoebox online is a great alternative. Please go to Samaritan's Purse UK, Pack A Shoebox Online - Operation Christmas Child.

You can either choose your gifts online via the Pack Your Shoebox option or you can choose to send a pre-packed shoebox which is even easier! Either option costs £20 which includes £5 for project costs. Please then add it to our St Michael's Church, Braintree, Operation Christmas Child Online Shoebox Goal Page and help us to reach our target of 30 online shoebox gifts for 2022! You also get a bit longer to do your online shoeboxes, with the deadline being 21st November 2022.



How to pack a shoebox

Step 1 – Find a shoebox

Find an empty, medium sized shoebox and wrap the box and lid separately in colourful wrapping paper. Alternatively use a preprinted shoebox. There are some pre-printed Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes available in church, along with some plain ones, if you wish to wrap them yourself. Attach the appropriate boy/girl label, marking if your gift is for a boy or girl. Select an age category, 2-4 years, 5-9 years or 10-14 years and attach the label to the top of your shoebox. These labels are also available in church.

Step 2 - Fill with suitable gifts

What goes into a shoebox?

Toys: This can include any of the following: soft/cuddly toys, a toy truck, toy cars, doll, small musical instrument, yo-yos, skipping rope, balls (a deflated football with a pump can be included), small puzzles or cards. From 2021 4 suit playing cards can be accepted.

School Supplies & Creative Activities: E.g. pens, pencils, sharpeners, crayons, felt tip pens, solar calculators, fun stamps with ink pad sets, notebooks, colouring books, solid paint palette and brushes, stickers or stencils.

Hygiene Items: E.g. toothbrush, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel or sponge.

Other Items: E.g. Hat, gloves, scarf, sunglasses, cap, socks, t-shirt, hair accessories or small handbag.

Home Crafted Items: (Optional) E.g. knitted hats, gloves, scarf or bags etc.

A Note From You: (Optional) This could include a Christmas card, note or greeting, photo of yourself or family.

PLEASE DO NOT INCLUDE: Toothpaste, lotions or liquids, used or damaged items; war related items, seeds, gum, chocolate, sweets or food items; religious or political literature; medicines, aerosol cans, sharp or fragile items. Items packed from this list will be removed from shoeboxes at the processing centres.

Step 3- Make Your Project Donation

A suggested donation of £5 per box is recommended to cover project costs including shipping. You can make the donation online at Follow Your Box. You will need to print out the barcode and place it inside your shoebox on top of the contents. This will enable OCC to tell you which country your shoebox gets sent to. Alternatively you can post your donation, please go to the Samaritan's Purse UK website for more details on this.

Step 4 - Personalise and Pray

If you wish you can personalise your shoebox by including a handwritten note and/or a photograph of yourself/family. You may also like to pray for the child that will receive your gift.

Step 5 - Drop Off Your Shoebox

Place a rubber band around each closed shoebox and please drop off in St Michael's Church welcome area by Sunday 13th November 2022

I'd like to help but can't fill a box

No problem! Donations of any of the above items (fillers) that go into boxes are always welcome. We can make up some 'church boxes' from these and any surplus items can be taken along to the processing centre along with the completed shoeboxes. Donations are used there to help fill up other boxes where needed. Monetary gifts are always welcome to aid with transport costs and other expenses. The requested transport cost per box is £5.

100 YEARS OF CROSSLINKS

Michael Maclachlan* is the kind of person who succeeds at whatever he turns his hand to.

LEADING CADET.

For instance, in 1962 he finished as the leading cadet at the RAF pilot training school in South Cerney in Gloucestershire. But it was not long before God called to him the ordained ministry of the Church of England. Then the next step for Michael, Kit and there family was to go the Artic.

1990s

'We went to the Artic because we felt we had something to give back for all the wonderful things that God had done for us. And yet, we ended up giving very little, only receiving. It was a privilege to share the Inuit's lives for a little while. We did an ordinary job in an extraordinary place.' Kit Maclachlan,

Michael and Kit offered themselves to CROSSLINKS and were sent beyond the Artic Circle. We traditionally think of missionaries as working in the steamy jungle or dry desert places. However, the Maclachlans turned up in this part of the world to help the church among the Inuit people to share the good news of the Lord Jesus Christ in that part of Canada.

70 YEARS BEFORE

In 1924 the Revd and Mrs A. T. Houghton began CROSSLINKS work Myanmar. Bishop Houghton writes, 'Our medical work rapidly broke down barriers of hostility'. A local person asked what the Revd A.T. Houghton's job was. The easiest way to translate what he did was to say that he was 'Assistant to the Lord Jesus Christ'!

1,420 'ASSISTANTS TO THE LORD JESUS CHRIST'

Since 1922, when CROSSLINKS was first founded these 'Assistants' have gone to Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, the Gambia, South & North Africa, India, Thailand, Belgium, France, Cyprus, Spain and the Czech Republic as well as Chile.

OCTOBER 2022

This October marks CROSSLINKS big birthday. Here in the south-east of England there is celebratory service at 6pm on Thursday 6th October in Dundonald Church, Raynes Park, South London.

THE NEXT 100 YEARS

FARMING SEASON

It's the beginning of a new season and after a hot, dry summer the recent rain has provided us with a good opportunity to cultivate the soil ready to drill next years' crops. Cultivations including ploughing have gone well this year. The ground cracked up naturally because it dried up so much and this help loosen the soil.

At the end of August we drilled our oilseed rape, which has now established well. This is not an easy plant to grow especially when it is first planted, relying on plenty of moisture to make sure it gets growing quickly. This is essential otherwise an insect called cabbage stem flea beetle starts eating the plant as it begins to grow and if the new plant cannot grow quickly enough this beetle will destroy it all together. In the past farmers were able to use an insecticide on their seed treatment which prevented this happening, but because this chemical was banned they are no longer able to do so. Optimum drilling times are now so important, and it is good that farmers can learn to adapt without potentially harmful chemicals so that they can keep producing their crops in a more environmentally safe way. Today we added early liquid fertilizer to the oilseed rape in the form of nitrogen and sulphur to enable the plants to keep growing and be strong before the winter. This will help them survive the next threat in the form of pigeons, who like to graze the plants over the colder months when there are fewer other food sources available.

During September we set about our annual task of muck spreading, which is something we always try to complete as quickly as possible. Our close neighbours are always very tolerant of the smell but we wouldn't want them to put up with it any longer than they have to! This organic manure is an important addition to the fertilizer we add to the soil and it is

rich in potassium and phosphorous as well as nitrogen. As I have explained before artificial nitrogen production relies on natural gas which makes it both expensive and heavily reliant on fossil fuels.

With the cultivations completed our other seedbeds are almost ready for the wheat to be drilled during the first weeks of October. We often use the previous crop to home save our seed for the current year, which is also something we will be doing this week. This involves sieving the grain to take out all the unwanted seeds including weeds and small grains which might be less vigorous during germination. The seed is then dressed with seed treatments, which are chemicals designed to help growth and protect the plant from seed born diseases. Before we start drilling the wheat in the next couple of weeks there is a little time to trim some of the hedges back as they continue to grow and encroach on the field margins. While doing this we will also look to expose field drains in the ditches to make sure they are clear for the winter months. October is always a busy month on an arable farm and it is the farmers job to make sure his new crops get off to the best start possible as this can set the tempo for the strength of the crop for the entire year.



One concerning thing I have noticed this year is the odd sick seagull in the countryside, which is not something I have really noticed before. Often seagulls flock behind the tractor when we are cultivating because they are keen to get earthworms as the soil is freshly turned over. There is not much I can do to stop them from stealing my worms, which are incredibly important creatures for improving the soil quality and structure. There have been reports that many seagulls are dying this year, particularly around coastal areas where they are found in greater numbers, and this has been attributed to avian flu.

During this time of year farming gets mentioned in church harvest festival services, which take place in September or October. Traditionally rural folk would have celebrated with big parties over the fact that the harvest had been safely gathered in, and many villages still have harvest suppers. The mood is best summed up in the following hymn:


Come, ye thankful people come

ALL PLAYING OUR PART?




