

PRINCE OF PEACE

Dear Friends,

As we prepare for Christmas this year, I hope you will have an opportunity to reflect on the words of the prophet Isaiah, who referred to the promised Messiah as "Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6).

It is such an appropriate title for Jesus Christ, the Messiah who Isaiah looked forward to. Because Jesus came to earth, that first Christmas, primarily to offer us **peace with God**. As Paul wrote, "Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." (Romans 5:1). Jesus' death on the cross offers us the opportunity to be at peace with God.

God's love also calls us to seek **peace with one another**. "If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all." (Romans 12:18).

This Christmas, I believe we should also be praying for **peace in our world**. The tragedy of the war in Ukraine has shown us again the horror and sacrifice of war. We will be praying for a lasting and just peace in Ukraine.

We have a variety of services including our "Join in Nativity" (come dressed as part of the Nativity) and Christingle service – anyone would be welcome to these services, but they are particularly suitable for children & families. We have "Carols by Candlelight" and a Midnight Communion (from 11pm on Christmas Eve), as well as services at 8am & 10am on Christmas Day. Details of our services are on the next page.

It would be great if you are able to join us, as we celebrate the birth of our Saviour Jesus. And please consider if there is anyone you could invite to come to a service.

Stand By Me have been rescuing children since 1995. They provide child-centred care as they consider the needs of each child, their family and their community.

The following points explain the work of Stand By Me in their own words...

Loving care

We get to know each child — their hopes, history, needs and dreams. We delight in our children and want the best for them. We invest our time, love and attention raising them to know that they're loved and accepted for who they are.

Strong families

Usually the best place for a child to thrive is in their family – that's why we work hard to help families stay together. In the absence of a stable family, we place children who are at risk into our loving family homes.

Great education

A great quality education is key to escaping poverty. Our education programmes equip our kids with the skills they need to rise above their circumstances and help change their communities.

Access to healthcare

The health of our children is vital to their development and happiness, so we go the extra mile to make sure that they are fit and well, and can enjoy their childhood.

A reason for hope

It's a privilege to teach our kids of Jesus' love for them, and to demonstrate this through the quality of our care. As their desire for spiritual answers grows, we encourage them to discover a love, respect and knowledge of God for themselves.

Caring relationships

It's incredibly important to each child's sense of value and stability that they're raised by parents and teachers who care about them. Child sponsorship supports this further by giving our kids a relationship with a sponsor who loves them and helps them feel part of a wider family.

Stand By Me has developed four care programmes to meet the individual needs of the children they work with. These programmes are Children's Homes, Schools, Care Centres and Family Support.

They are currently working in the following countries...Dominican Republic, Myanmar, Colombia, Romania, Ethiopia, India, Nepal and Kenya.

We continue to sponsor and support Tsion from Ethiopia through Stand By Me and we receive letters and updates.

A THOUGHT FROM THE PAST - Margaret St John-Coleman

Many in St Michael's will remember my late husband, Tom. Recently, when sorting through a miscellaneous collection of his papers, I came across a page torn from an old St Michael's parish magazine. It contained a short article by Tom, written in 1976.

At that time Tom was regularly travelling all around the British coast, seeking out suitable sites for locating radio transmitters for ship-to-shore radio communication. I knew from things he told me many years later that some of the locations were in the north of Scotland, including going out by helicopter to oil rigs. This piece must have been written after just such a visit, when the management had decided to give their visitor a guided tour of the whole installation! So here are Tom's reflections...



IN THE DEPTHS - A MOMENT TO PRAISE

The crew's piped rock-music jarred from wet concrete walls three feet thick. Sea water dripped from the rungs of the lower-stage access ladder down which I had just climbed. I was now a

good 100 miles north east of Peterhead, and 400 feet below the level of the North Sea.

I followed my safetyman guide on to the sea bed: pools of water on a surface of rough concrete. "See the chambers where the pipes come in - and leave again."

"I have never been anywhere like this in my life," I thought. "What shall I do? Why, of course, remember the Lord - like Jonah did" (*Jonah 2:7*).

"I praise Thee, Lord Jesus, Creator and Redeemer," I whispered once - and again. What an opportunity, to praise my Lord from the depths of the sea. But, oh, that I had been able to say it aloud, without fearing that my guides would think the depth experience had been too much...

I was probably not the first Christian to have descended the core of Total Oil's concrete pumping Platform MCP-01, on the sea road from far Frigg Field to the Scottish mainland, and to think like this. But perhaps I was the first whose daily Bible reading that very morning had included *Isaiah 51:10* with its reminder that it is really by the power of the arm of the Lord that man has "dried the sea, the waters of the great deep".

HE GAVE HIS LIFE FOR HIS BROTHER

In January 2011 there were some terrible thunderstorms in Queensland, Australia. There was serious flooding. Donna Rice was driving with her sons Jordan (13) and Blake (10). Her car gets enclosed by some terrible flooding. Someone tries to help. Even though he first reaches Jordan to bring him into safety, the boy insisted that his little brother should be saved before him. Whilst Blake is being saved, Jordan and his mother are torn off the car roof and carried away by the flood. These two can only be pulled out of the water having died.

"Jordan died for his brother" declared the headlines. The youngster displayed a great deal of courage and selfless love for his brother by scarifying himself for him.

This sad story leads my thoughts to Jesus Christ, the good shepherd who gave His life for his sheep (John 10:11). He accepted God's justice on my behalf. He was crucified to bear the punishment for my sins. On the cross He cried out: "My God why have you forsaken me?" to which He did not receive an answer (Matthew 27:46). He gave His life to save me.

I took His saving hand and believed what He did for me on the cross. He freed me from my sins, the power of Satan and death. On top of this He gave me eternal life.

A VISIT BY PROF JEANNE McCARTHY FROM GEORGIA

Jonathan Wicks received a request from the above lady to see where Nicholas Udall's play, "Ralph Roister Doister", was performed. Udall or Woodall was vicar at St Michael's in 1530 and headmaster at Eton. The play is considered the first comedy play written in English. Jeanne is a professor of English studying Shakespeare from Georgia in the U.S.A. Her request was handed to me as I have an interest in the Reverend Udall.

After a trip round the church, we managed to get a visit to the Braintree Museum courtesy of Polly Redman and also saw the main council chamber in the Town Hall. One of the pictures on its walls shows the landing of the Reverend Hooker in the U.S.A. after he had escaped from the hands of Archbishop Laud. He then went on to found the City of Hartford Connecticut.

We then went to see where Jeanne had lived in the Avenue after she was born in 1956. Her father had been an American Colonel in the U.S.A.F. during the war flying Thunderbolts. The owner kindly showed us around.

We also saw the American Air Force window in the Catholic Church. After this, we did the history tour of Bradford Street including where the family of the second and sixth Presidents of the U.S.A. John Adams and John Quincy Adams stayed, namely Tabor House. This was rounded off with late lunch to end a busy day.
